RESEARCH POSSIBLE CAREERS.		
	Job shadow at a business/organization that interests you. Check to see if you could do an internship, which provides you with great real-world experience.	
	Talk to professionals currently working in your area of interest. Ask your school counselor or parents/guardians to help you find them.	
LEARN ABOUT THE MANY WAYS TO PAY FOR COLLEGE.		
	Learn about the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and how it can help pay for college.	
	Forecast how much financial aid you could qualify for by using studentaid.gov/aid-estimator/.	
KEEP APPLYING FOR SCHOLARSHIPS.		
	See if your high school has a scholarship coordinator to help you find scholarships to apply for, but don't forget to also look in your community and search online. Arizona schools have counselors and/or college and career specialists to help with this process.	
	Apply to at least three scholarships during your junior year
